

# Wild and Untamed



See the wild and untamed in North Dakota by visiting one or more of its 63 national wildlife refuges, more than any other state, or 11 Wetland Management Districts. Hike at the national park or look through the fence at the Albino bison. It's all good and wild.

**Sullys Hill National Game Preserve**, Fort Totten, ND, [www.fws.gov/sullyshill](http://www.fws.gov/sullyshill)

Located south of Devils Lake, this 2.5-square-mile refuge is home to many species, including prairie dogs, elk, coyotes, beaver and bison and a variety of birds.

**Theodore Roosevelt National Park**, both units, <http://www.nps.gov/thro/index.htm>

Each unit, north and south, has untamed beauty and wild bison. You may come across mountain goats, wild horses, prairie dogs, fox, elk and deer. Look up in the sky, too, where you can see a golden eagles, hawks, turkey vultures or owls.

More than 16,000 acres of lakes, marshes, prairie grasslands, coulees and cultivated fields is a perfect venue for viewing.
